In 1982, New Hope Ministries began with an exploratory committee of representatives of local churches and concerned citizens who lived in and around Dillsburg. They asked questions like, "Where do people in our community know when they are struggling with poverty?" And, "What does it mean to be a person of faith and good conscience when a neighbor is struggling with hunger, cold, homelessness, unemployment, and has run out of hope?"



The result of these conversations is that New Hope Ministries was founded as a Christian non-profit, social service agency, and opened its doors in January 1983. New Hope became the place you could go for healthy food, kindness, and a second chance. Over the past few decades, our experiment in loving our neighbors God's way has grown into a network of mutually supporting help offices across six communities and three counties. Along the way, we've made a lot of friends, and want to share credit with some of our amazing partners, including hundreds of local church congregations, community groups, local municipalities, local businesses, county and state governments,



We offer programs for seniors, families, kids, and anyone who comes through our doors. We try to live by our values of Faithfulness, Compassion, Dignity, Wholeness, Cooperation, Stewardship, and Accountability, and know that we are only successful when we work together and remember that everything we do for the "least of these" we do it unto Him.

SINCE 1982, NEW HOPE MINISTRIES MEETS BASIC HUMAN NEEDS OF LOW-INCOME AND IN-CRISIS FAMILIES AND INDIVIDUALS IN OUR LOCAL COMMUNITIES.

Through the love and hope of Christ, New Hope builds stronger, more stable communities by providing a safety net for people facing hunger, homelessness and financial crisis as we equip our guests to move toward long-term stability.

Through our six offices and five monthly mobile food pantry locations, New Hope provides an array of basic needs services to over 22,000 individuals: “Dollars & Sense” classes teach budget and money management skills; nutrition and cooking classes help guests learn how to choose and prepare healthy meals on a budget; and job training programs and workforce development opportunities such as high school equivalency (GED) preparation classes, Nurse Aide classes, Forklift Certification Training, CDL Class A truck driving program, and a Welding program lead to self-sufficiency.

New Hope also offers weekend backpack programs, which provide nutritious, easy-to-prepare foods to families with children over the weekend and summer months when free and reduced school meals are unavailable. New Hope



also offers youth programs that provide a safe place where low income children, who are at risk of academic failure and future poverty, can achieve academic success, feel a sense of belonging, and work to develop qualities needed for a successful life. Our programs provide hands-on and parent-centered supervised recreation, educational activities, community service, and life skills instruction.

Our vision is for the children in our youth programs to be safe and healthy, to be prepared for school and life, to develop character, and give back to the community.

Typical New Hope guests are those living at or below 200% of the federal poverty level and including the “working poor,” senior citizens, single parent households, and families thrown into chaos by illness, job loss, spousal abandonment, or other crisis. Guided by our faith, values, and compassion, we seek to be good stewards of the resources we have received and would consider it the highest compliment for a client family not to need our services any longer.


